WHAT HAPPENED?

Due to a lack of adequate funds, the Avon High School building program is stymied in its bid for completion by September, 1971. The building program came through without problems until August 5, the day municipal school bonds were to be sold. However, the bonds did not sell, mainly because Congress is proposing to tax the income obtained from buying municipal bonds, and people aren't purchasing them until they find out how much tax will be placed on the bonds.

Mr. David Rankin, Superintendent of Avon Community Schools, has looked into other methods of raising the funds, but feels that until this situation is taken care of, the program will be temporarily halted; he hopes not for long.
