



THE EDITOR SPEAKS

The school paper is published monthly for the students and the community surrounding the school

"Putting the paper to bed" requires much work, more than you may realize. To begin with, the plans of the paper must be set up long before. Plans consist of setting up each page, the stories to be covered and who should be assigned to cover them.

Each month every staff member is assigned a part for the next issue and he is to write up the material assigned him. After material is turned in, it must be edited, then dummies of the material must be typed and placed into position as planned.

After the dummies are set up, the typists are ready to cut stencils and the artist is ready to go to work. Once this is done the paper has gone to press. Each page is mimeographed separately and this requires time and patience. At this point the final step is underway,--the paper is stapled and ready for delivery.


RURAL YOUTH MEETING HELD AT AVON


Donald Earl Francis, a member of the graduating class of 1942, is employed as a bus driver on the Greyhound Lines.




